Bobcats are solitary animals and opportunistic predators that primarily hunt rats, gophers, rabbits, and squirrels.

IS IT A BOBCAT OR MOUNTAIN LION?

Bobcats are often confused for Mountain Lions, but they have distinct differences. Follow this guide to help you determine what wild cat you spotted.

Bobcat

- 3 ft. long
- 20-30lbs
- Dark brown with spots and light belly fur
- Short tail

Mountain Lion

- 7-9 ft. long
- 90-160lbs
- Uniform tan brown
- Long tail with dark tip

IF YOU ENCOUNTER A BOBCAT

Bobcats are naturally very timid animals that are wary of humans. Bobcats are aware of their surroundings and will hide/run when afraid. When you encounter a brazen bobcat, make the bobcat uncomfortable by hazing it:

- Yelling
- Flinging your arms above your head
- Throw items in the direction of the bobcat
- Do not run or turn your back
- Make yourself appear larger and stand your ground
- Pick up children and pets to make yourself look bigger
