The terrified puppy was cut free and quickly rushed to our veterinary clinic. Thankfully, she had not suffered any physical injuries.

Word about the abandoned puppy spread quickly, and soon a kind foster parent opened her home to this sweet girl. After all the puppy had been through, the foster did not want her to spend Christmas at the shelter. She offered to take the puppy in for a few days to give her a loving home for the holidays.

Those few days were all it took for the scared, shy puppy to begin coming out of her shell. She befriended the household cat and started to explore her new surroundings.

Each day brought more progress, and soon it became abundantly clear to her foster mom that this pup was there to stay. She was so full of mischief that her foster mom named her Sassy.

"I felt so badly for her, being abandoned like that. That's how it started, anyway," her foster turned adopter said. "Then I began to realize that she filled a hole that I had felt since my older dog passed a year before. Sassy was the Christmas present I hadn't known I needed."

Thanks to you, we were there for Sassy when she needed us most. Because of your generosity, Sassy now lives in a loving home where she'll never have to worry about being abandoned again.

The good Samaritan gently placed the baby squirrels in a hat to create a makeshift nest and played baby squirrel sounds through their phone. Finally, the mother squirrel appeared! She carefully picked up each of her babies in her mouth and carried them to safety, one by one.

That information is passed on to our adoption team, who use it to help find a great new home for the dog.
