HELPING COMMUNITIES AFTER DISASTER

Animal Control Officers Assist Maui Shelter with Pet Recovery

When the Maui Humane Society reached out to shelters in California requesting relief for their animal control officers after the Lahaina fire, we at Pasadena Humane were happy to help.

Two of our veteran animal control officers, James Garcia and William Van Stralen, were deployed to assist, patrolling the burn areas in search of lost pets unaccounted for after the fire. The officers patrolled for five days, visiting affected areas before residents could return to the rubble where their homes once stood. Many families were forced to leave their pets behind when they fled the fire.

This was a very difficult assignment. Our team often found themselves contacting families to relay sad news, but also an important sense of closure.

While on Maui, the officers say what kept them going was the resilience of everyone they encountered. "We couldn't walk through the shelter without a dozen people stopping us to thank us for being there," recounts Officer Garcia. "They felt a great sense of support in sharing this burden, and sometimes just needed another shoulder to cry on."

Disaster response is an important and necessary role that Pasadena Humane readily provides to our community. Thankfully, our generous supporters allow us the flexibility and funding to help other animal welfare organizations in their times of need as well.

KITTENS TAKE TO THE SKIES

Animal Transports Help Save Lives

People often say that Los Angeles doesn't have seasons, but the reality is, we're almost always experiencing the effects of *kitten season*. Due to southern California's moderate climate, kitten season – the time of year when we see a drastic influx in the number of kittens coming through our doors – spans from March all the way through November.

The result of our expanded kitten season is that there are more young felines than there are adopters. Compare this to the Pacific Northwest, where a cooler, rainier climate creates a shorter kitten season. Adopters are ready to bring a new family member into their lives, but fewer kittens are available in their area to fill that need. That's where Amelia Air steps in.

Amelia Air is a "small but mighty group of volunteers" who fly hundreds of animals a year (including puppies and adult dogs) to shelters or rescues where they'll have a better chance at finding their forever families. Last year, Amelia Air transported a total of 56 cats and kittens from Pasadena Humane to the Oregon Humane Society – and overall, we transferred 236 cats and kittens to partner shelters in 2023.

Each cat and kitten transferred to another shelter allows us to welcome another feline into our care. Your generous support makes partnerships like these possible, helping us save the tiniest of lives all year long.
